#### INTRODUCTION TO THE DAY

The joy of the disciples' last supper with Jesus is muted and imperfect, but it is enough to carry them through the difficult hours ahead. In the Bible, this evening is rich with symbolism that engages all senses: the washing of dusty feet, the smell and taste of bread and cup, the gentle words of Jesus. In this service, which blends the traditional Maundy Thursday liturgy with multisensory reflection and prayer, we seek God's quiet joy together as we enter the Triduum, the Great Three Days preceding Jesus' resurrection.

### **CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS**

Friends in Christ, in this Lenten season we have heard our Lord's call to struggle against sin, death, and the devil—all that keeps us from loving God and each other. This is the struggle to which we were called at baptism.

Within the community of the church, God never wearies of forgiving sin and giving the peace of reconciliation. On this night let us confess our sin against God and our neighbor and enter the celebration of the great Three Days reconciled with God and with one another.

A brief silence is kept for reflection.

Most merciful God,
we confess that we are captive to sin
and cannot free ourselves.
We have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed,
by what we have done and by what we have left undone.
We have not loved you with our whole heart;
we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves.
For the sake of your Son, Jesus Christ,
have mercy on us.
Forgive us, renew us, and lead us,
so that we may delight in your will
and walk in your ways,
to the glory of your holy name.
Amen.

God, who is rich in mercy, loved us even when we were dead in sin, and made us alive together with Christ. By grace you have been saved. In the name of + Jesus Christ, your sins are forgiven. Almighty God strengthen you with power through the Holy Spirit, that Christ will live in your hearts through faith.

### FIRST READING: Exodus 12:1-4, 11-14

<sup>1</sup>The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: <sup>2</sup>This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. <sup>3</sup>Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. <sup>4</sup>If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it.

<sup>11</sup>This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the LORD. <sup>12</sup>For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the LORD. <sup>13</sup>The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt.



Do this in remembrance of me." <sup>25</sup>In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." <sup>26</sup>For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

### **GOSPEL ACCLAMATION**



GOSPEL: John 13:1-17, 31b - 35 The holy gospel according to John. Glory to you, O Lord.

¹Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to God. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. ²The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper ³Jesus, knowing that God had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, ⁴got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. ⁵Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. ⁶He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" 7Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." <sup>8</sup>Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." <sup>9</sup>Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" <sup>10</sup>Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." <sup>11</sup>For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

<sup>12</sup>After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? <sup>13</sup>You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. <sup>14</sup>So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. <sup>15</sup>For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. <sup>16</sup>Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. <sup>17</sup>If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.

<sup>31b</sup>"Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. <sup>32</sup>If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in Godself and will glorify him at once. <sup>33</sup>Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Judeans so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' <sup>34</sup>I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. <sup>35</sup>By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

This is the good news of the Gospel.

### **INVITATION TO PRAYER STATIONS**

During this time, you are invited to reflect on the emotions, themes, and sensations of Jesus' last supper with his disciples in the upper room. Four prayer stations with simple reflection prompts are available for you to visit. You may visit any or all of them in any order or simply remain in your seat. Music is provided during this time; please feel free to sing along.

### Station 1: Lord, Are You Going to Wash My Feet?

**Location:** Stay in your seat

**Reflection Prompt:** When Jesus, Peter's rabbi and leader, knelt on the floor in front of Peter to wash his feet, Peter was initially shocked. As you sit in your pew, close your eyes and imagine what it must have been like for Peter. Feel the pew or chair under your legs and against your back. Feel your feet on the floor. Imagine someone you respect kneeling in front of you. Does it feel uncomfortable? Strange? Somehow familiar?

**Prayer:** Jesus, help me be receptive to gestures of grace and kindness from others. Open my heart to recognize the places all around me where you humble yourself in surprising situations. Teach me how to be humble, too. Amen.

### Station 2: Not My Feet Only But Also My Hands

**Location:** Front right sanctuary entrance (bowl of water)

**Reflection Prompt:** When Jesus explained to Peter how important it was that Jesus wash the disciples' feet, a menial task often delegated to the household slave, Peter was amazed, and he asked Jesus to wash his hands and head, too. Use the pitcher to pour warm water over your hands gently. Smell the light fragrance of the bergamot oil. Dry your hands on the towel. As you symbolically wash your hands, imagine the loving tenderness with which Jesus washed his disciples' feet. What else do you imagine?

**Prayer:** Jesus, help me to give freely to others, but help me learn to receive others' care graciously, too. Show me the places all around me where you kneel in front of the poor and marginalized to wash their feet. Teach me to kneel there beside you. Amen.

### Station 3: Betrayed, He Took a Loaf of Bread

**Location:** Front left sanctuary entrance (bread maker)

**Reflection Prompt:** When Jesus shared the last supper with the disciples, he had already been betrayed by one of them. He gave them bread – his body – anyway. Breathe in the generous aroma of the freshly baked bread, which we will soon share for communion. In the upper room, Jesus was generous and unconditional with his love. Where else do you find Jesus unconditionally loving others today?

**Prayer:** Jesus, teach me to respond to other people with love, even when it seems ridiculous or impossible. Surround this hurting world with love like the pervasive smell of fresh-baked bread. Amen.

### Station 4: I Give You a New Commandment

**Location:** Narthex outside the rear of the sanctuary (chairs with soft shawls)

**Reflection Prompt:** Although the terrifying violence of Good Friday was about to begin, Jesus spent the last evening of his life teaching about love rather than about the coming horror. Perhaps he intended love to have a protective effect for his disciples, who would soon have to face fear and danger without Jesus by their side. Sit in the cushioned chair and wrap the shawl around your shoulders, like a hug. Consider: how has love helped you get through tough times before?

**Pray:** Jesus, cover me with your love. Hold me close when I face danger, grief, or pain. Shelter people throughout the world who have no other protection from war, violence, or abuse. Amen.

Save us from the time of trial and deliver us from evil.




#### **INVITATION TO COMMUNION**

Psalm 22 is chanted as the altar is stripped. The stripping of the altar is a ritual removal of all objects and decorations that recalls the betrayal of Jesus and foreshadows the preparation of his body for burial.
